### **Hate Crime in the South West**

Figures from Avon and Somerset, Wiltshire and Gloucestershire police forces reported LGBT+ hate crimes rose by more than 50% in the West between 2019 and 2021. Figures from the three police forces revealed a total increase from 712 reported incidents to 1,109. However, only a quarter of hate crimes and incidents are reported to the police. Seven in 10 victims report the incident to no-one.

Evidence suggests that the main reasons victims do not report hate crimes is that they do not think the incident is serious enough to report or they did not know that the incident perpetrated against them was an offence.

# **Examples of LGBT+ Hate Crime**

- Using threatening, abusive or insulting words or behaviour, or disorderly behaviour,
- Attempting to harm or physically harming another person, and acting in a way that causes the victim to fear that they will be harmed.
- A person who without lawful excuse destroys or damages any property belonging to another intending to destroy or damage any such property (e.g. flag burning).

Put simply, if an incident occurs which is motivated by hate or prejudice but is not necessarily a criminal offence, then it is known as a hate incident. Although hate incidents are not criminal offences, they are still a serious matter and should be reported.



# How do I report a hate crime?

By phone: Dial 101 for non-emergencies (non-life-threatening), or 999 for emergencies in which life is in danger.

### Report anonymously:

If you do not wish to disclose your personal details, you can call Crimestoppers on 0800 555 111.

After you report an incident, your details will be stored securely and will not be shared outside of the police database.

**Did you know?** You can use your mobile to text to 999 if you do not feel safe to speak on the phone. You must register to use this service before texting in an emergency. To register simply text 'register' to 999. You'll then receive a response confirming you are set up to communicate by text in the future. Do not use this function for any non-emergencies, and do not reply to the initial confirmation message.
